Academy Awards on TV tonight

The point is that the unexpected always happens on the "Academy Awards" and those who deem to ignore the program miss live television at its potentially entertaining best.

Granted, the television audience is not privy to the fistfights between distaff side performers demanding a better position in the presenters line or the tender farewells exchanged between male stars, when they are forced to grab one of the ruffian female's hands and march on stage with them, but all in all, the excitement level generated by such diverse characters is almost unnerving.

Just a few years ago, for example, Charlton Heston, who played Moses but thought he was playing God, had a flat tire and became a five-minute no-show. Unfortunately, the five minutes he missed were vital ones.

In his stead came Clint Eastwood, an actor known for his ruggedly handsome looks and quick trigger finger, but little else. It was a shattering experience for everyone involved. Eastwood discovered all about opening night bends and millions of viewers discovered that Eastwood couldn't read a simple declarative sentence.

Be that as it may, the "Academy Awards" still provides the nation's viewers with two hours plus of more fun than they can possibly handle in a night, much less two hours.

All I know is that I wouldn't miss tonight's presentation of the Oscar show any more than I would miss mass on Sunday, and that's never.
