

Cardinals Clip Braves' Lead, 5-2

McDaniel Hurls Four Scoreless Relief Innings; St. Louis Scores Three Unearned Runs

ST. LOUIS, June 10 (AP)—Lindy McDaniel pitched four scoreless relief innings and the St. Louis Cardinals benefited from three unearned runs as they defeated the Milwaukee Braves tonight, 5-2.

The loss whittled the Braves' National league lead to one game.

After Milwaukee staked Bob Rush to a 2-0 lead on home runs by Hank Aaron in the first inning and Del Crandall in the second, shortstop Felix Mantilla's boot of Alex Grammas' grounder opened the gates for the Cardinals in the fifth.

The victory, the Cardinals' third in a row, went to starter Alex Kellner, who is now 2 and 1.

(New York Yankees, 1932) were able to hit home runs in four consecutive appearances until tonight.

The last player to hit four in a game was Joe Adcock of the Milwaukee Braves, who accomplished the feat in 1951. Gil Hodges hit four for Brooklyn in 1950.

Delahanty Hit 4 Others who hit four in one game were Ed Delahanty of the Phillies in 1896, Chuck Klein of the Phillies in 1935 and Pat Seery of the Chicago White Sox in 1948.

Thus, Gehrig and Seery were the only American Leaguers to turn the trick.

Rocky's four homers equaled the American League total base record (16) for one game shared jointly by Gehrig, Seery and Ty Cobb.

Adcock, who hit a double in addition to four homers in '54, holds the major league total base mark, 18.

Ruth, Ott, Foxx Never Hit Four It is noteworthy that such sluggers as Babe Ruth, Mel Ott, Jimmy Foxx, Hank Greenberg, Hack Wilson, Joe DiMaggio and Ted Williams never hit four in a game.

Colavito himself had never hit more than two in one major league game. He hit two in Boston on May 16—and had hit only three in the three succeeding weeks.

A Jekyll and Hyde hitter, Rocky turned ferocious beast, smacking homers No. 15, 16, 17 and 18, after being in one of the worst slumps of his career.

Three of his homers carried into the left field stands and the other cleared a portable fence in left-center, about 400 feet from home plate.

His third inning wallop with a man on base was off Oriole starter Jerry Walker. This was a blow of respectable proportions, close to the foul line.

No. 2 Is Best of Them All The bases were empty in the fifth when he hit No. 2 off Arnold Portocarrero. This was the best of the lot, sailing deep into the seats quite a distance from the line.

With a man on base in the sixth, he again connected at the expense of Portocarrero. This was the one that cleared the fence in left-center.

His fourth — also with the bases bare — was another down the left field line. It was off Ernie Johnson, who had not pitched a gopher ball all season.

Rocky knocked in six of the 11 runs as the Indians rolled up 13 hits, including homers by Minnie Minoso and Billy Martin. The six homers accounted

for 10 runs. Rocky scored five runs himself, for he was on base when Minoso drove his seventh homer into the left field stands in the first. Martin hit his in the second.

Rocky's blasts put him only one behind Washington's Harmon Killebrew, who leads the American League in homers with 19.

The Orioles' defeat dropped them into second place, a game behind the pace-setting Chicago White Sox and a half-game ahead of the third-place Indians.

Credit for the victory went to Sam Jones, now 7-5, although he needed relief in the seventh.

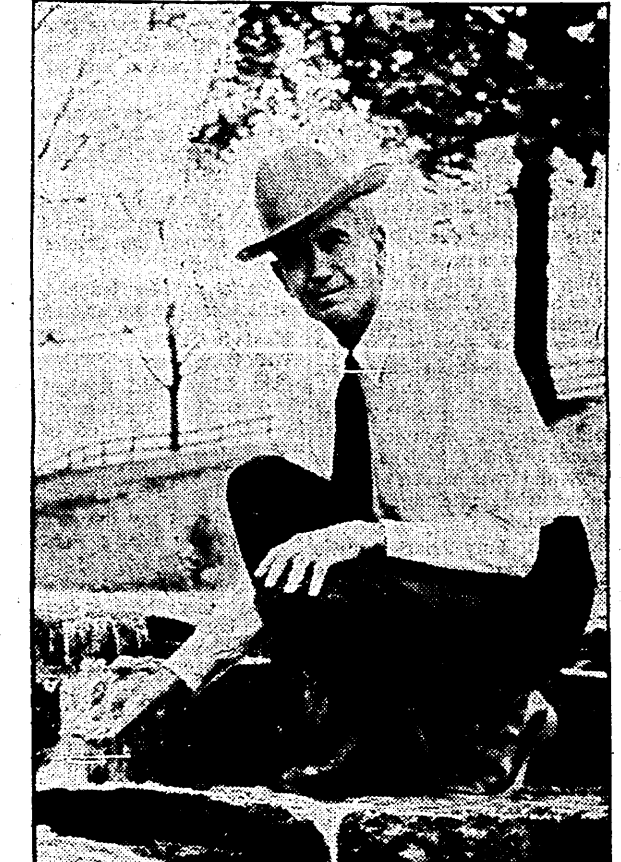
