Hits Homer to Decide Duel With Bridges; Double Triumph Puts Tribe Fourth.

DETROIT, June 3 .- The Indians oounced back into the first division oday, hurdling the bruised and battered forms of the Philadelphia Athletics, and landed in a virtual tie with the third place Tigers.

They did it by handing Detroit a double defeat while the Athletics ere soaking up their epochal lacing at the hands of Lou Gehrig and the other Yankees.

The tribe's twin victory was by

scores of 3 to 1 and 10 to 7 and they were that kind of ball games—one very, very good, and the other very, very bad.

Wes Ferrell won the opener all by himself, blanking the Tigers in all but one inning and hitting a home run with one on base to supply the two-run margin of his triumph. It was his ninth win of the year.

Mel Harder was the victor in the second game, and he had to holler for help from Sarge Connally before it was over. But after taking a 5 to 2 lead in the fifth inning, the Indians managed to match every Tiger run with one of their own and so coasted home in front in spite of the staggering of their pitchers.

Ferreil's game was a stirring duel between the Cleveland star and Tommy Bridges, the Tigers' slim righthanded youngster, and Wes' edge was in his bat rather than his pitching arm. He was hit freely, but always he had that little extra juice to turn on when another base knock would have meant a run—and a run in his game was more ima run in his game was more im-portant than three or four in the

portant than three or four in the nightcap.

The Tigers drew first blood, scoring their lone run in the third inning when, after two were out, Rogell drew Ferrell's only pass, Stone scratched a hit to the box and Gehringer singled cleanly to center.


